**Exams:** There will be two in-class tests, a common midterm and a final exam. In addition, there will be quizzes given each Wednesday. **No make-up exams or quizzes.**

**Common Midterm Exam:** Tuesday, October 21, 8:30-10:00 PM, LH-2.

**Common Final Exam:** Tuesday, December 16, 7:00-9:00 PM, LH-1.

**Please contact me as soon as possible if you cannot make one of the exams. Retroactive or last-minute requests for a make-up will be ignored.**

**Grading Policy:** The final grade will be based on the test scores, the final exam and the quizzes weighted as follows: each in-class test 15%, the common midterm 20%, the final 40% and the total for all quizzes 10%. In other words, out of the 500 possible points, each in-class test is worth 75 points, the common midterm is worth 100 points, the final is worth 200 points and all the quizzes are worth 50 points.

**Final Remarks:** You are responsible for attending class, behaving in class, taking class notes, doing homework problems, asking for and coming in for help, etc.; in the end, you are responsible for your success in this class so work hard! **Both class**

attendance and systematic work on the homework problems are crucial for the success in this class.
